#### **Welcoming Remarks and Introduction:**

#### Irene Hjelmervik, RUHS-Public Health, Program Coordinator II

- Irene warmly welcomed attendees to the coalition meeting, setting a collaborative tone right from the start
- The October agenda was shared with members, ensuring everyone was aligned on the key agenda topics.
- Housekeeping guidelines were highlighted.
- The mission and purpose of the RCHC meeting were presented, followed by a clear presentation of RCHC's mission and purpose.
- Engaging polls were conducted to identify diverse sectors represented in the room, with each sector making their unique noise with provided noisemakers.

# **Land Acknowledgement**

- A short video clip of Dr. Milanovich introducing the land acknowledgment, emphasizing the interconnectedness of all people and the importance of working together, was shown to the coalition.
- Irene read the Land Acknowledgement, recognizing the various native tribes of the region.

#### **Presentation: Youth Leadership Institute**

# Ashley Vega, Staff Danna Garcia, Staff

- Irene introduced the speakers.
- Speakers shared inspiring stories of how students have actively engaged in a range of community initiatives
- One highlight was the student-led Art Gallery, which showcased their creative works and attracted over 100 attendees.
- It served as a vital haven for youth to express themselves through art centered on mental health, touching on the themes of healing, resilience, and identity.
- Data Walk was highlighted. Students conducted surveys on the local environment and engaged in a narrative campaign to spotlight key findings, including air quality challenges in the ECV-Thermal, CA area.
- A compelling short video clip illustrated how environmental threats like pollution are taking a toll on community health.
- The team unveiled a Public Service Announcement (PSA) born from on-the-ground visits to document polluting land uses across the ECV.

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- Speakers showcased the Zines—a longstanding work of the Youth Leadership Initiative (YLI)—which
  weave together explorations of environmental justice, mental health, and shared stories from their
  communities.
- They amplify youth and resident voices on the topics they've uncovered, with a special launch slated for October 17th.
- These efforts honor the community by casting a warm light on the places and people that make it resilient and strong.

- How can coalition help to amplify your work? Coalition can play a pivotal role in amplifying our efforts by actively listening to the voices and stories of youth, while maintaining an open-minded approach to integrating these insights.

# Presentation: Special Service for Groups, Asian Pacific Counseling and Treatment Center (APCTC)

<u>Harold Custodio, Program Coordinator</u> Estee Song, Program Coordinator

- Irene gave a brief introduction of the speakers.
- The Asian Pacific Community Training Center (APCTC) operates from its main office in Los Angeles
  with outreach across surrounding regions. It provides mental health-focused services to adults,
  children, and diverse populations.
- Key initiatives include the CDC-RUHS COVID-19 Grant, which educated API communities on prevention through four subcontractors. Local outreach emphasized culturally sensitive communication with ethnic groups.
- A needs assessment collected 500 surveys from Inland Empire API residents, partnering with UC Riverside on geospatial maps.
- The CDSS Stop the Hate program offers cultural/arts activities and youth leadership workshops to promote cross-cultural understanding.
- The API VELOCITY program empowers API high school leaders to boost mental health literacy via arts and film production, including student-created films.
- The 10-week KITE Parenting program has reached 1,482 API families with children ages 6-17 since inception.
- The CMHP program addresses mental health needs of older adults, parents, community leaders, and general adults.

• Are programs open to other insurance providers? Programs are available exclusively to Medi-Cal patients.

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• How do you handle difficult situations? The intrinsic satisfaction of supporting others provides the resilience needed to navigate challenges effectively.

## Presentation: Respiratory Illness Update by RUHS-Public Health

Misty Plumley, RUHS-Public Health, Immunization Program Chief

- Irene introduced the speaker.
- Misty presented the SMARTER steps for preventing respiratory virus transmission, emphasizing targeted strategies to reduce spread.
- The session also featured an overview of the West Coast Health Alliance's (WCHA) core principles, guiding collaborative public health efforts.
- California Department of Public Health (CDPH) Respiratory Virus Dashboard, a key resource for residents to access up-to-date immunization data, was presented.
- WCHA's consensus recommendations for the 2025-26 respiratory virus season were shared, providing evidence-based immunization guidance tailored to community needs.
- Participants were encouraged to self-assess their risk, pursue vaccination, prepare in advance, and develop personalized strategies for support and well-being.
- Vaccination remains the most effective measure to prevent serious viral infections—empowering individuals to make informed choices for their health.

## Q & A

 A participant shared a harrowing personal account of contracting severe COVID-19, emphasized the importance of getting vaccinated, and extending appreciation for sharing the essential information regarding vaccines.
