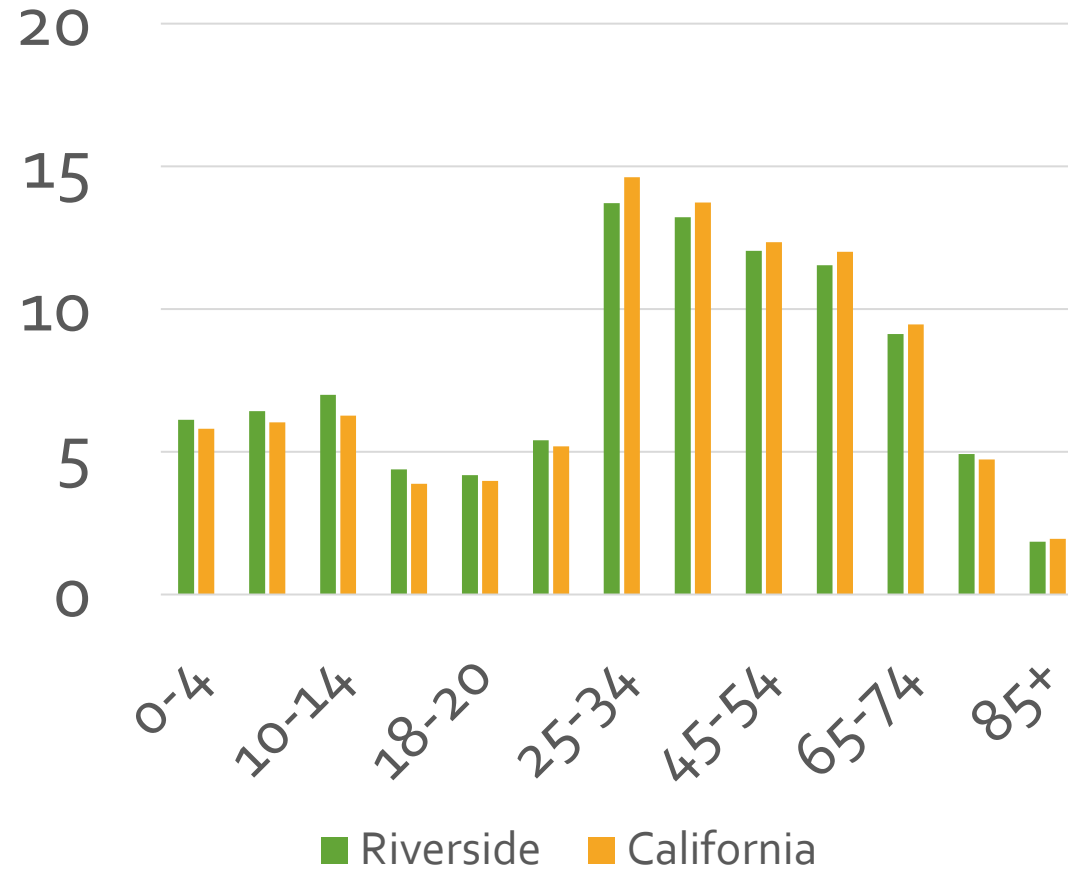

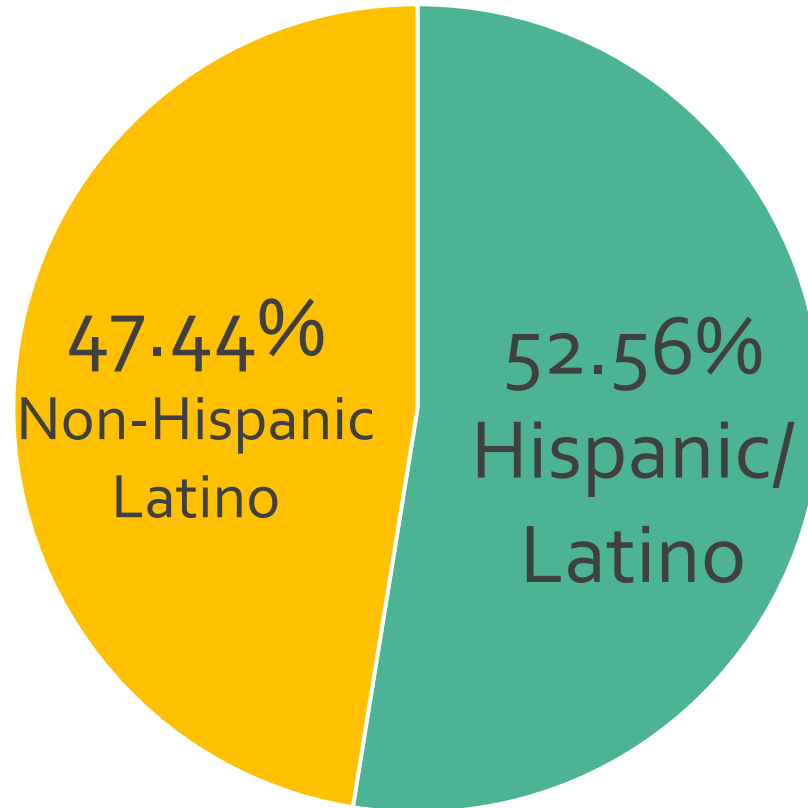

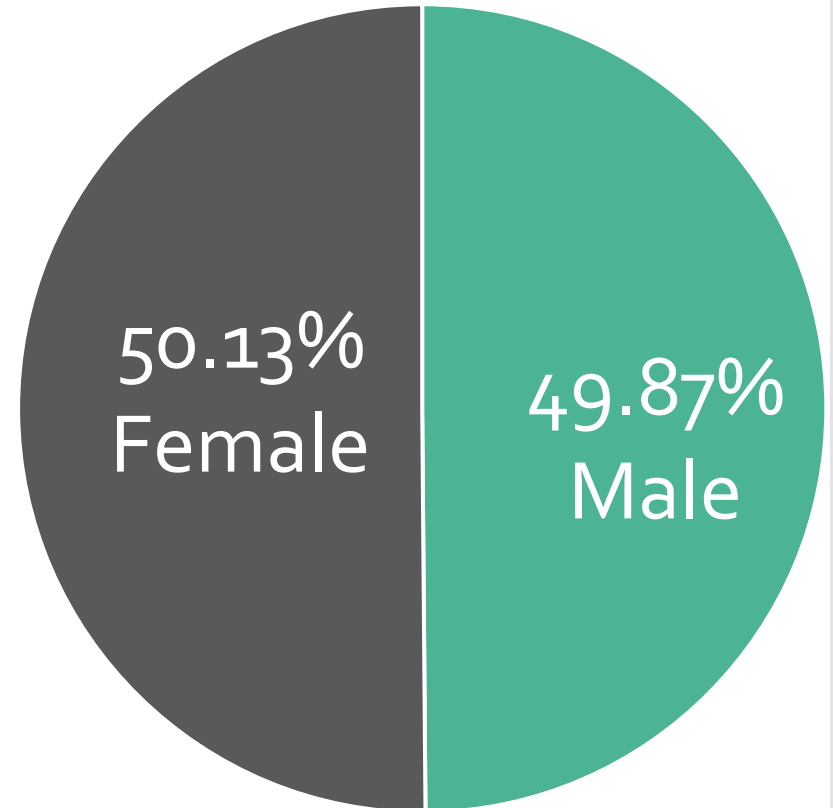

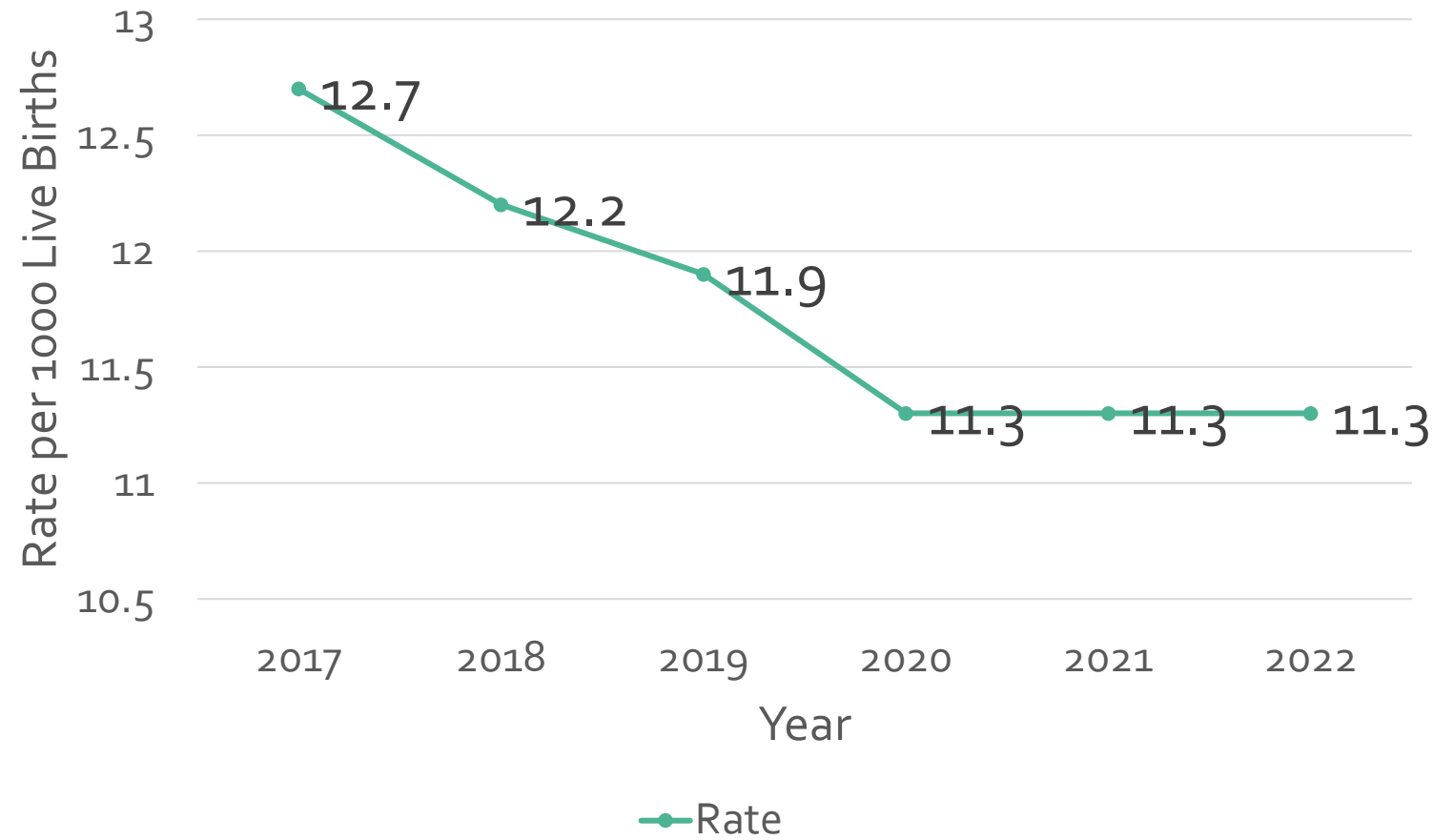

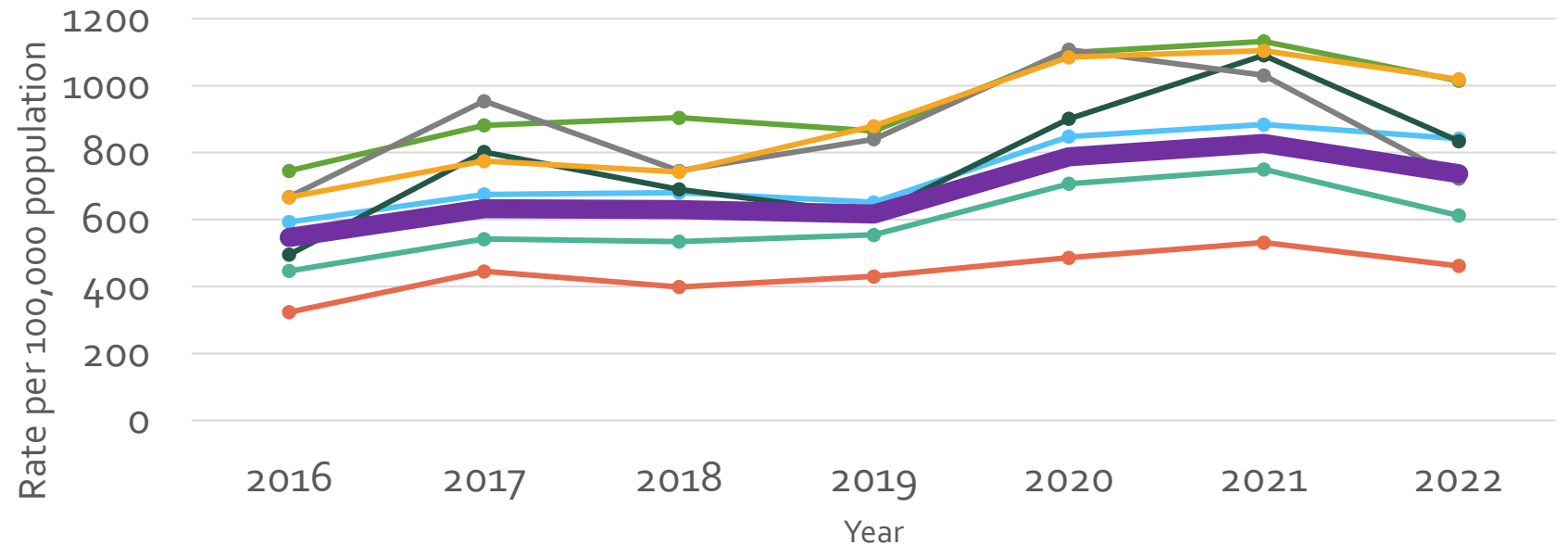
Age Adjusted Birth Rates, Riverside 2017-2022

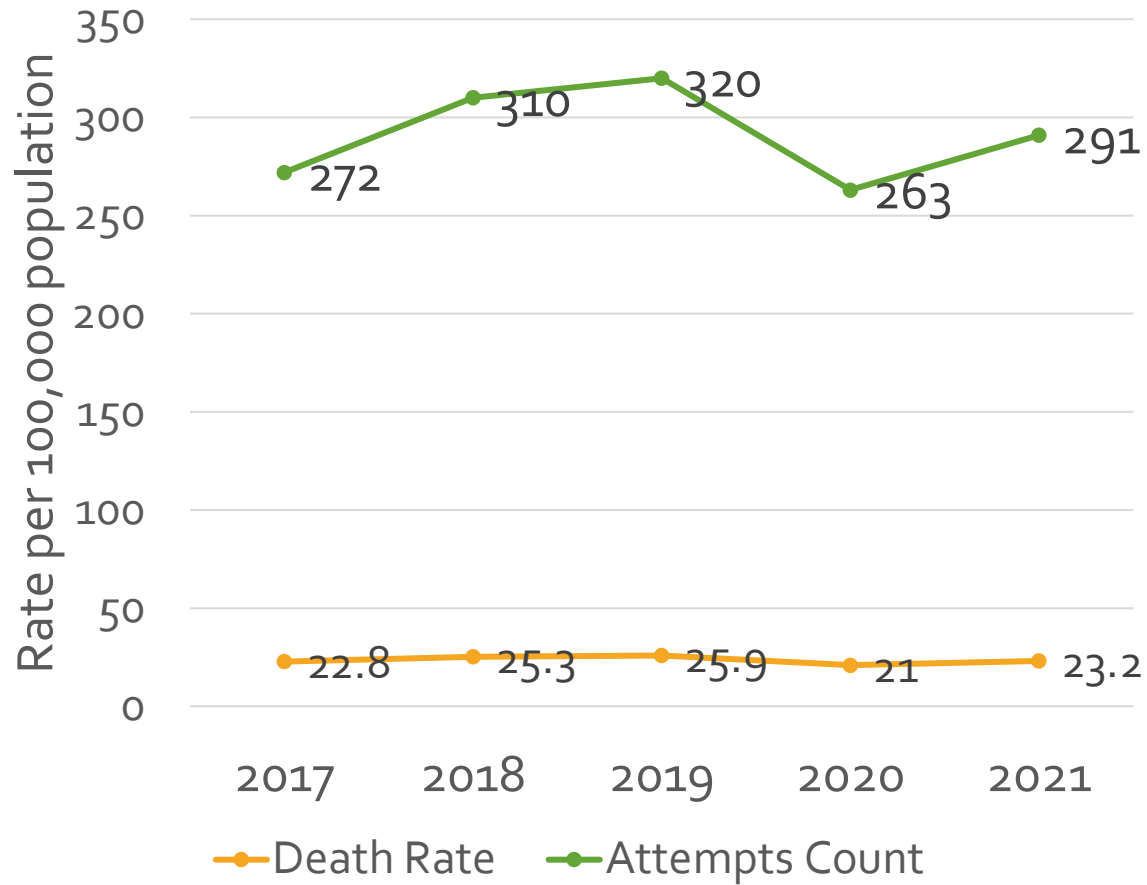

Suicide Deaths per Year

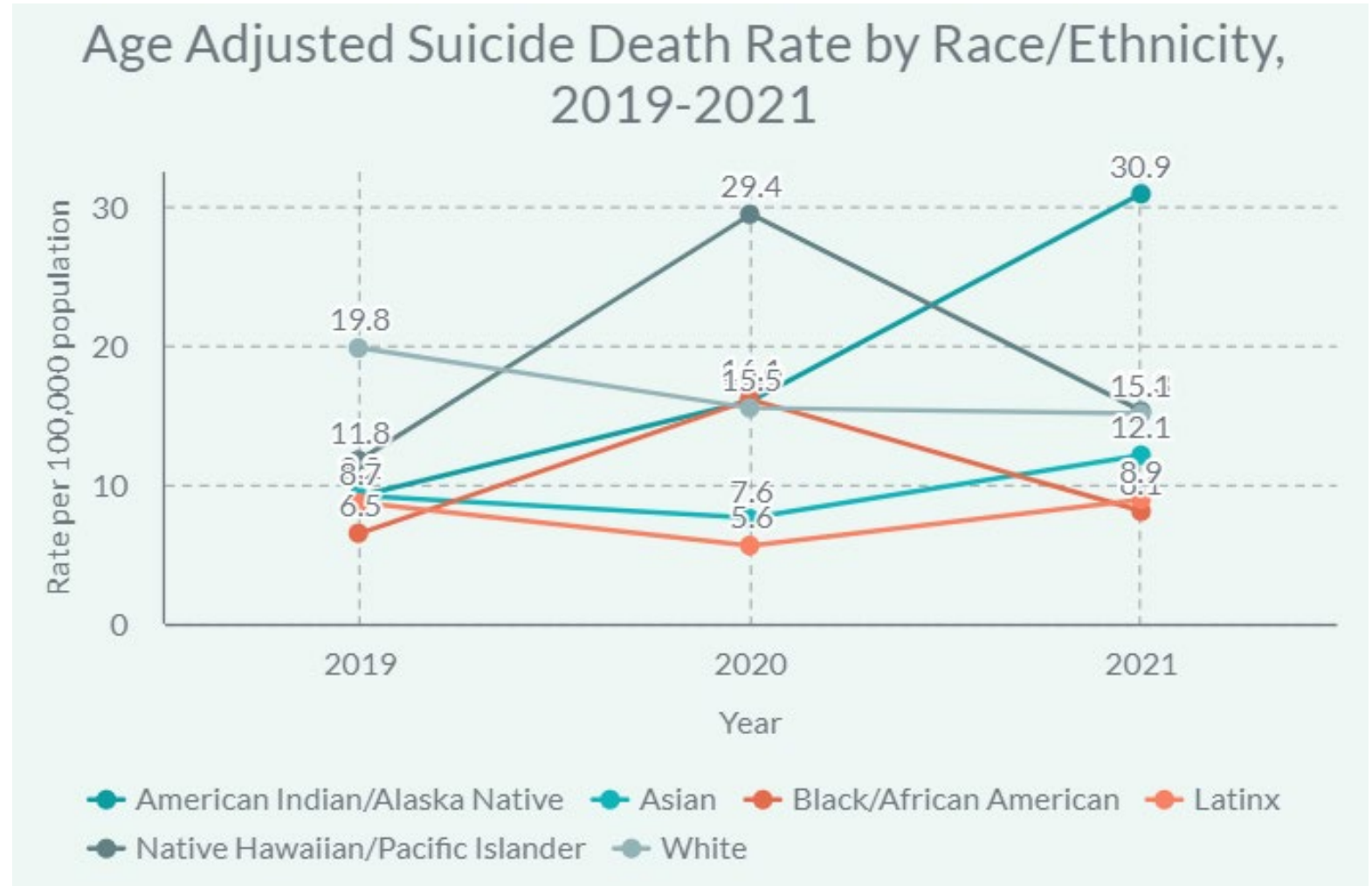

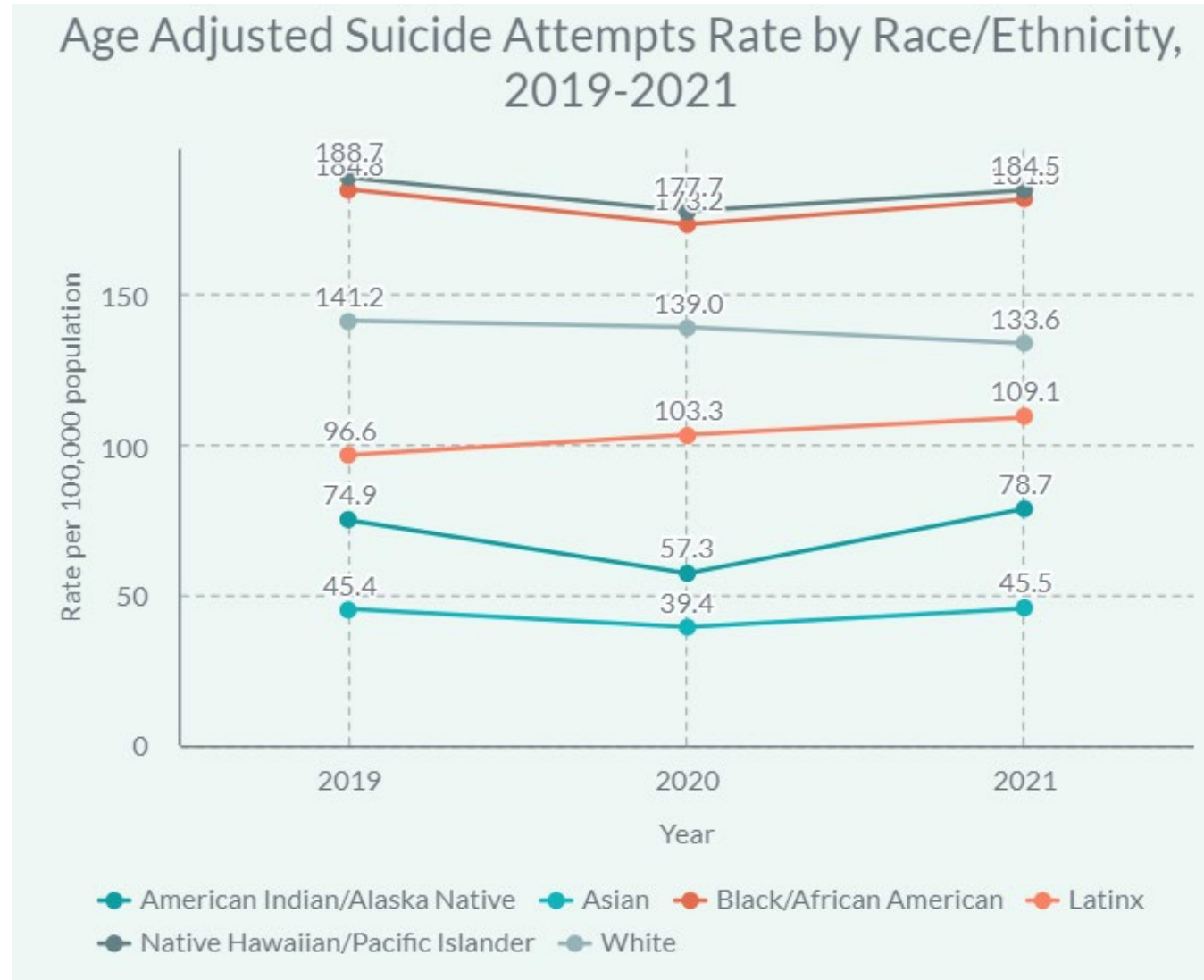

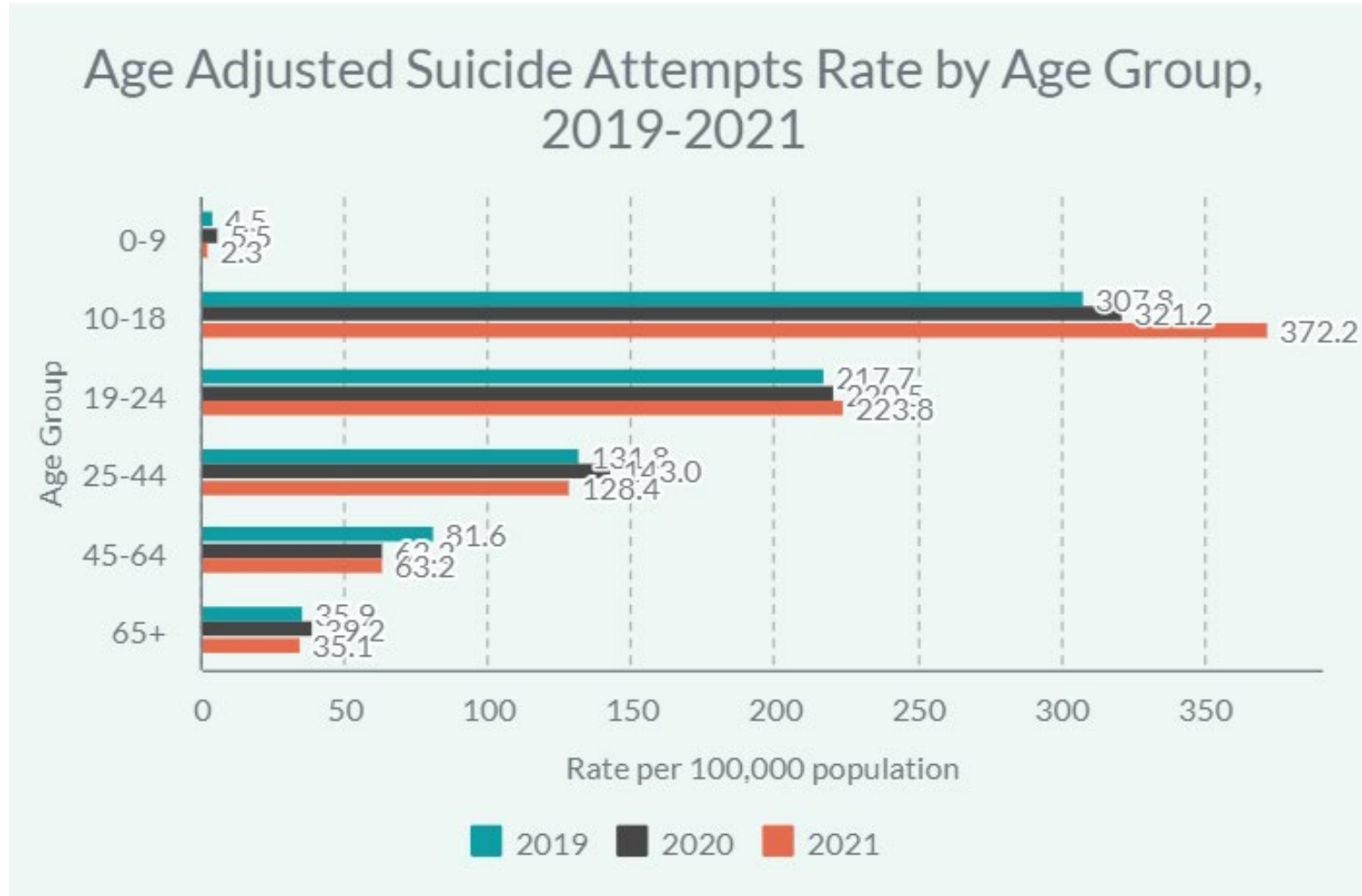

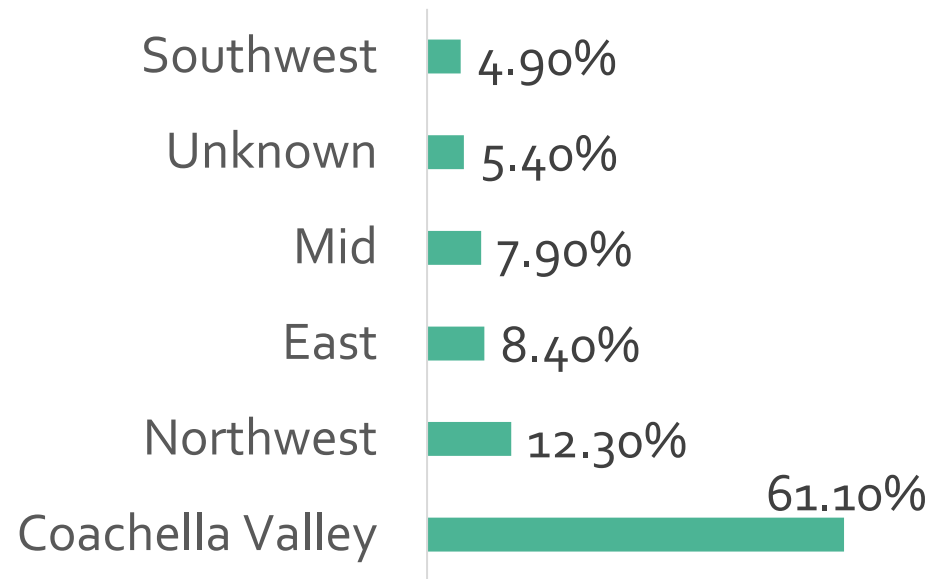

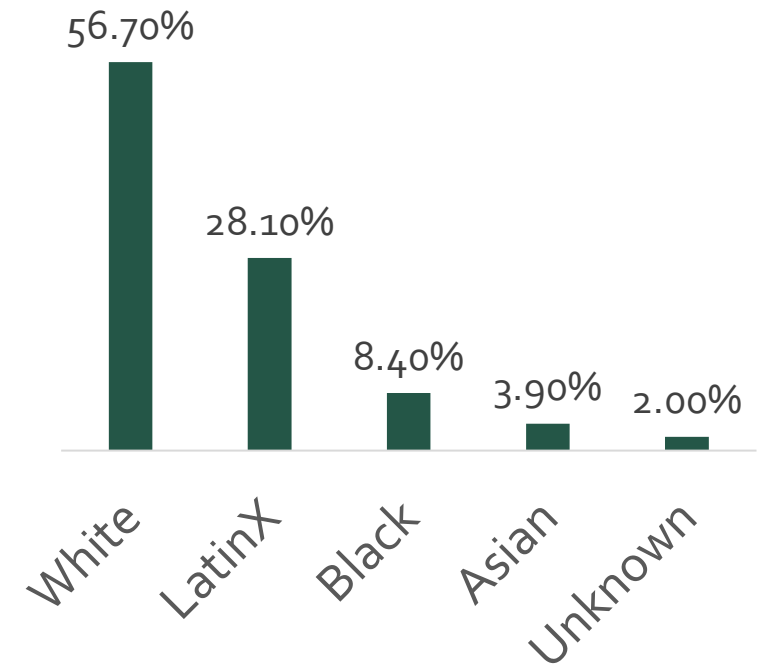


• Heat-Related Deaths (2023)

HRI by Hospital Region



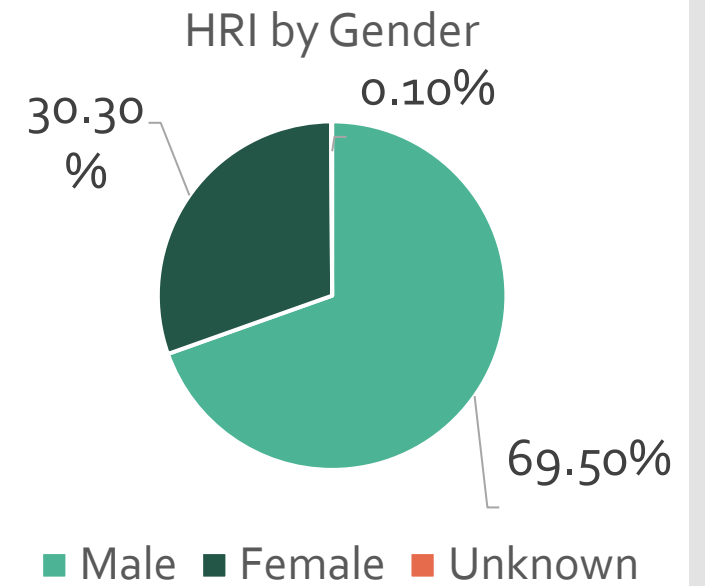
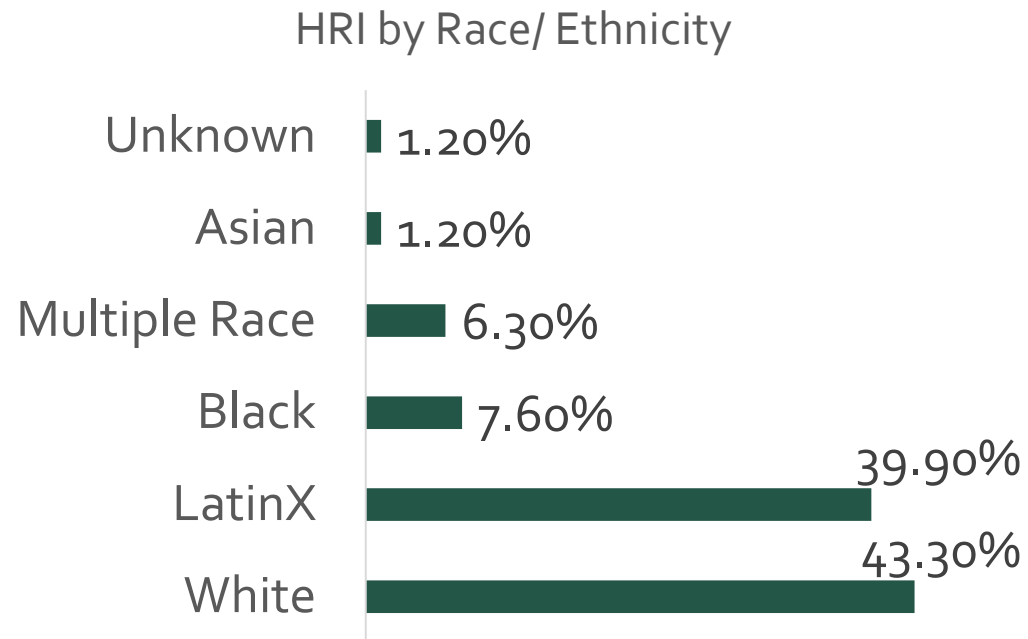

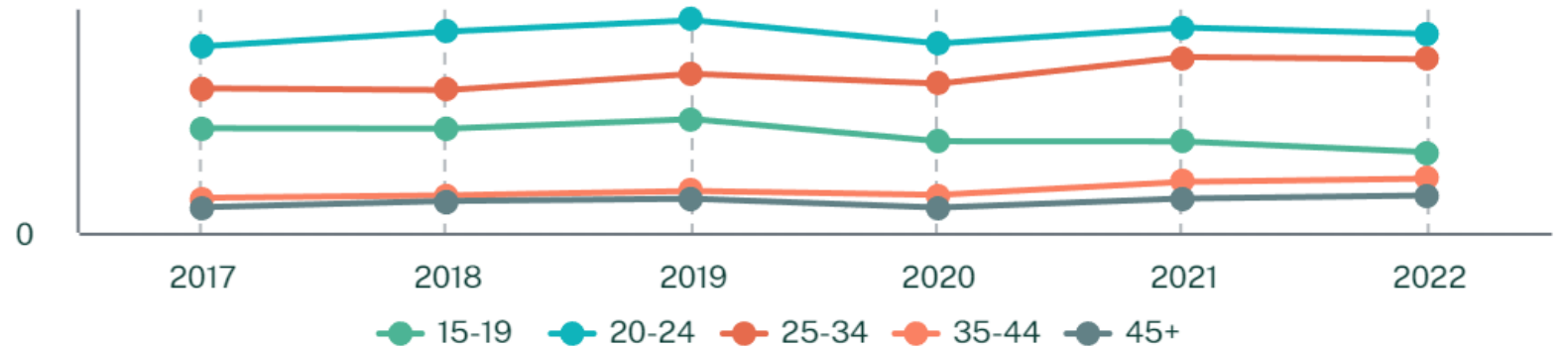

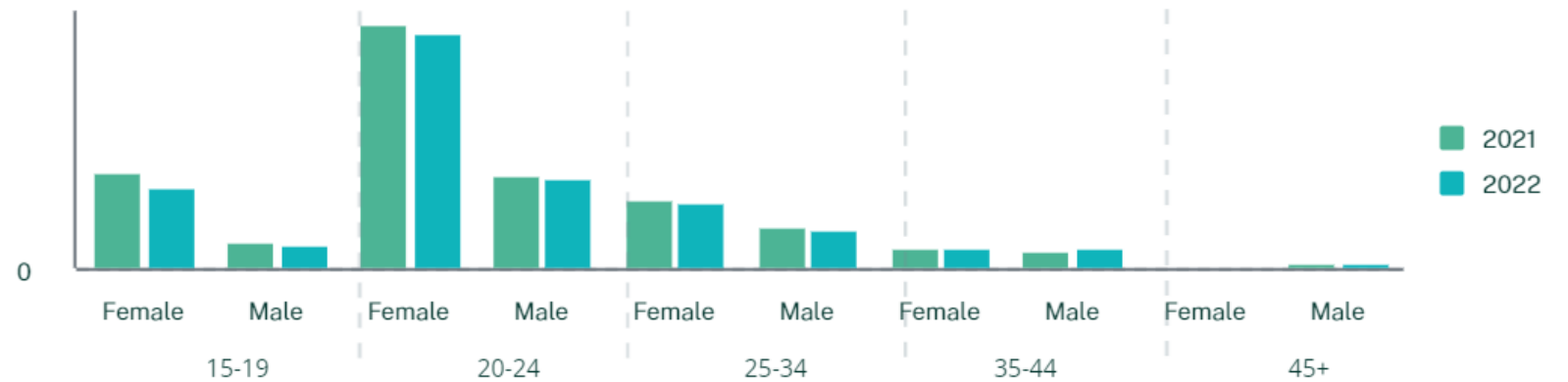

Chlamydia Age-Specific Rates by Sex and Age Group 2021-2022

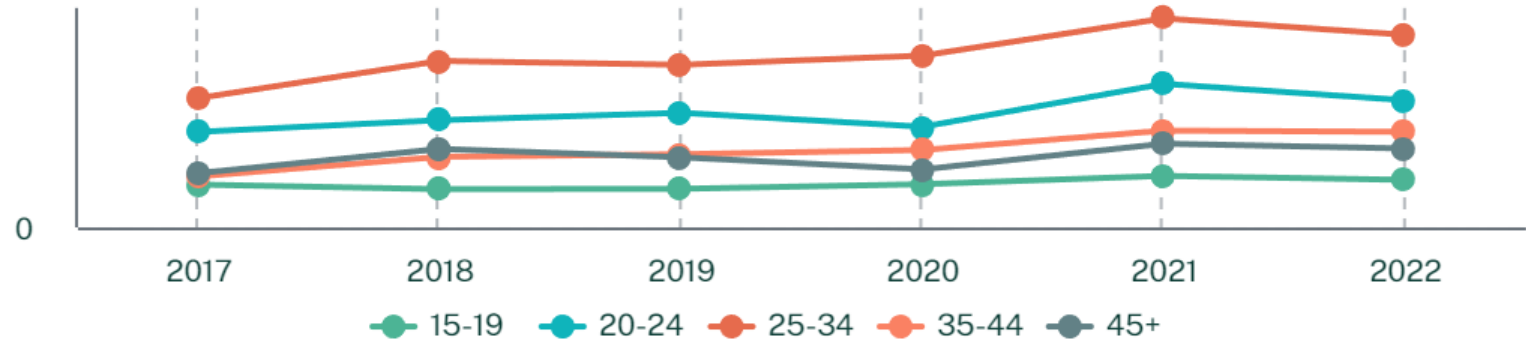

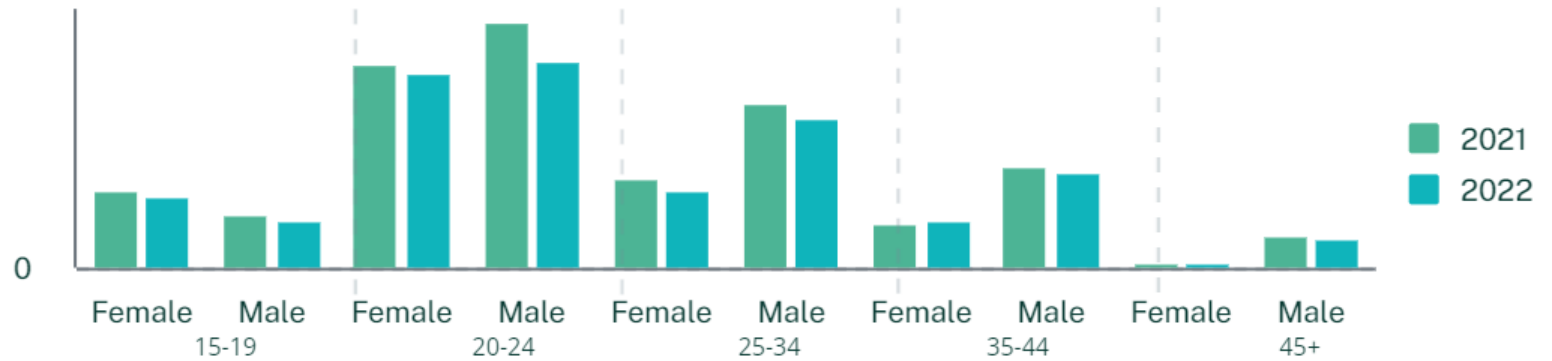

Gonorrhea Counts by Age Group and Year Riverside County 2017-2022



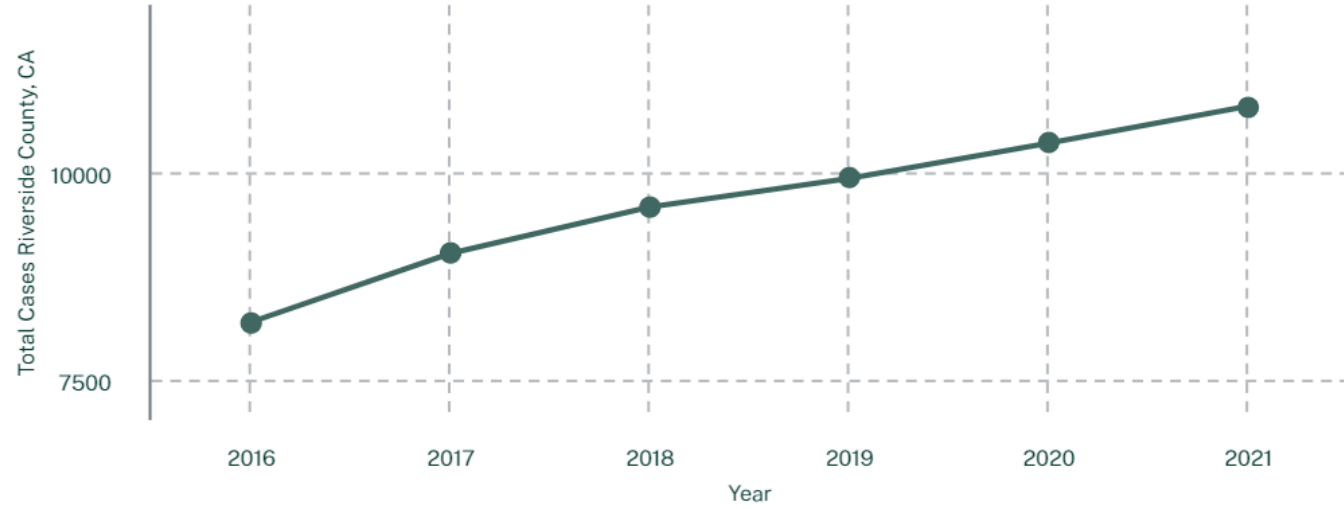

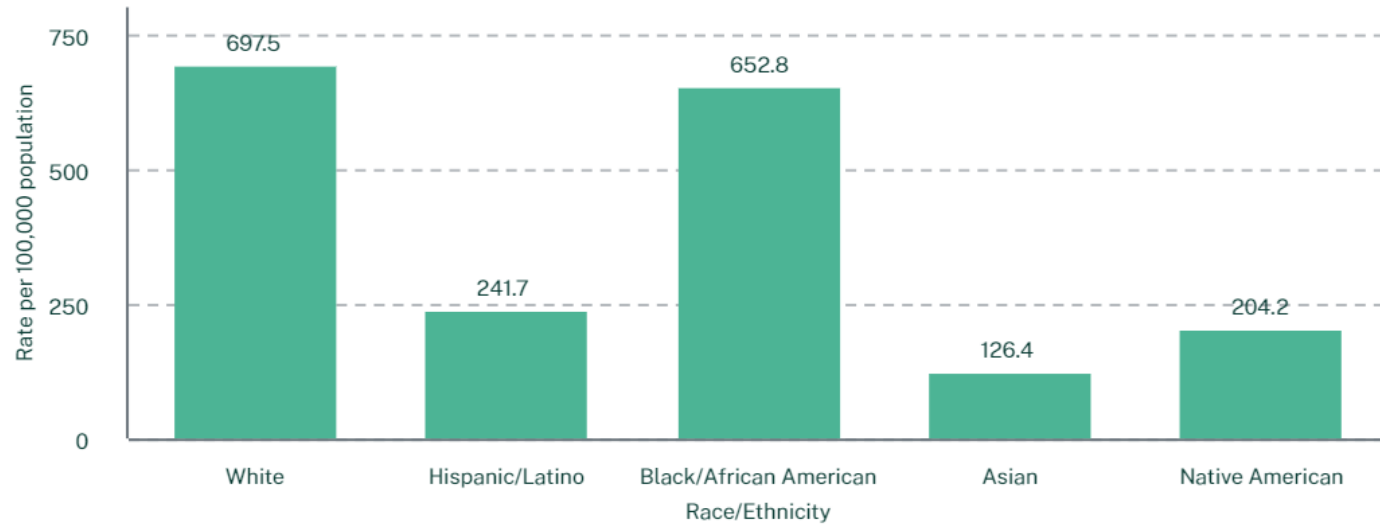

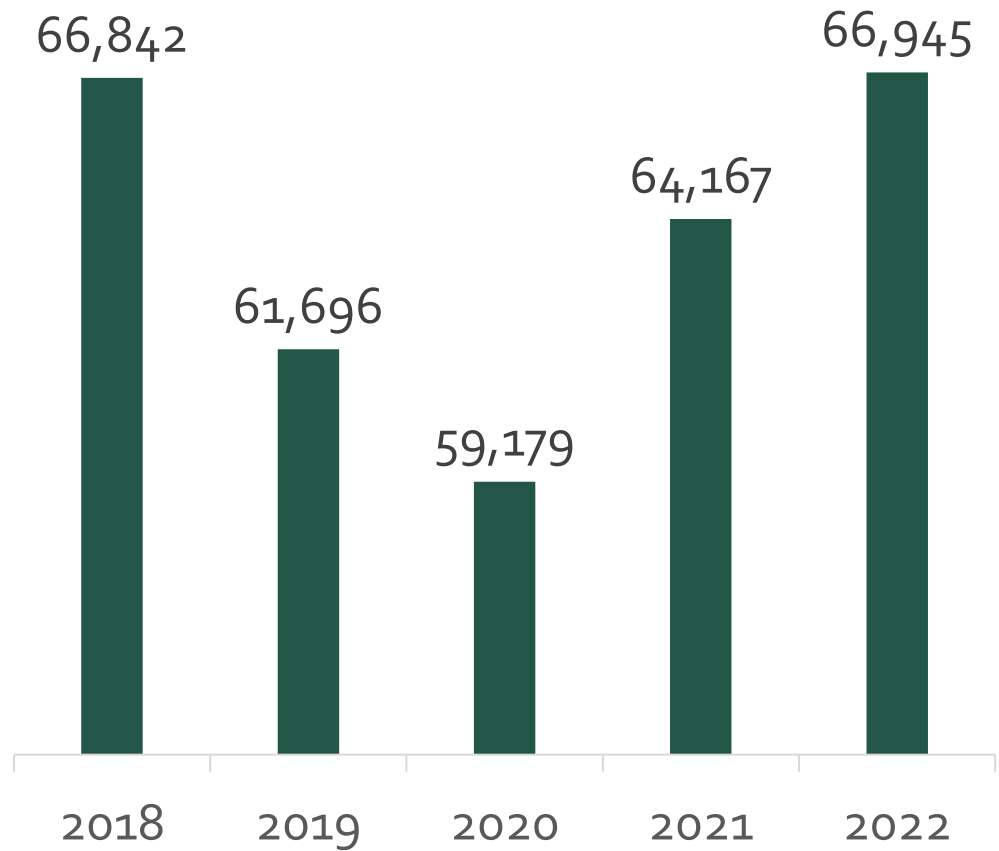
HIV Prevalence Rates by Race/Ethnicity, Riverside County, CA 2021

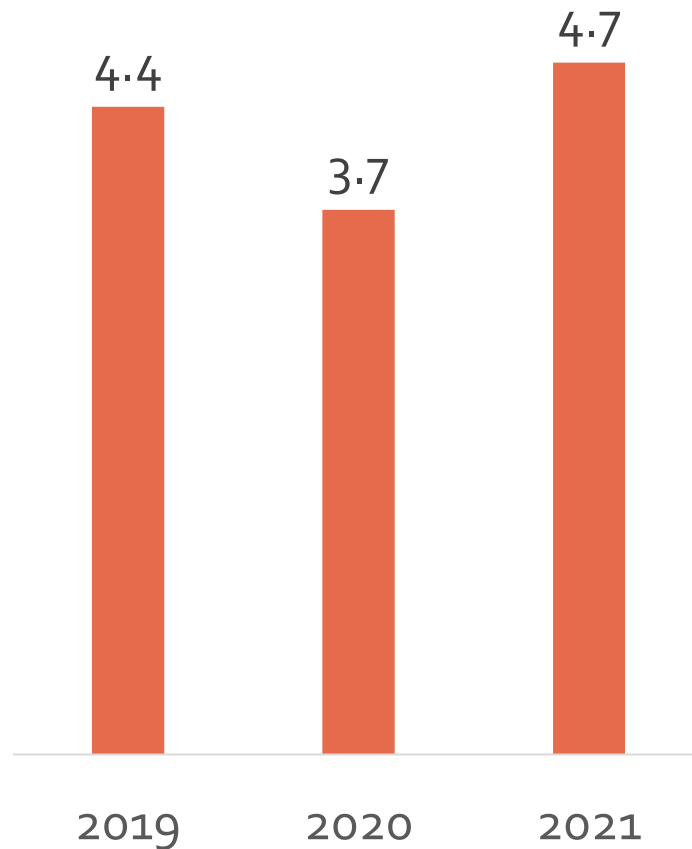

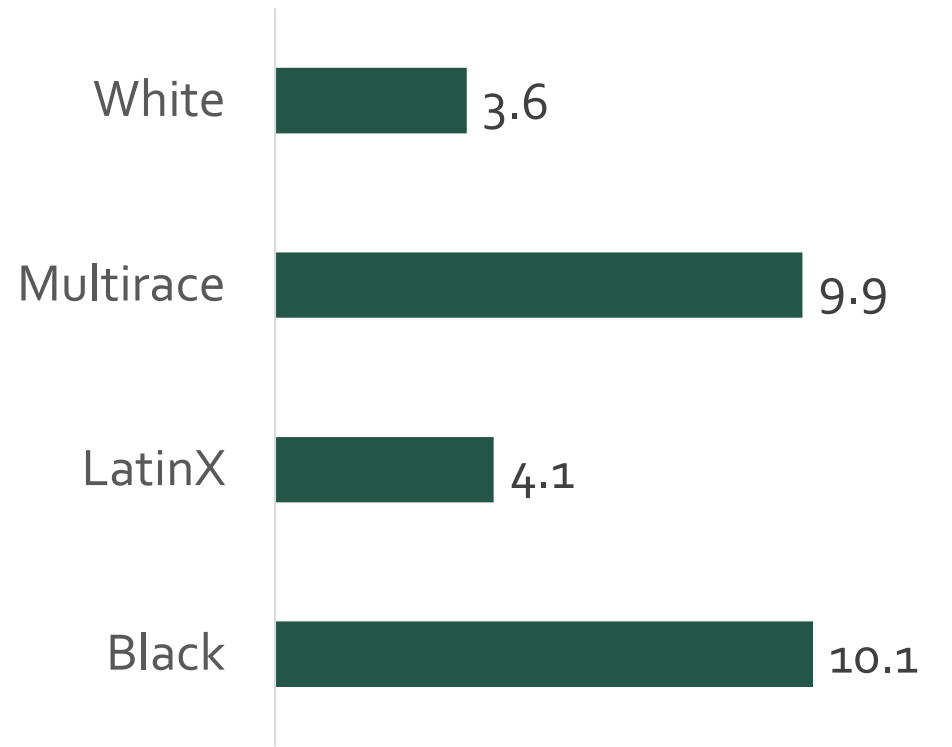

Infant Mortality Rate

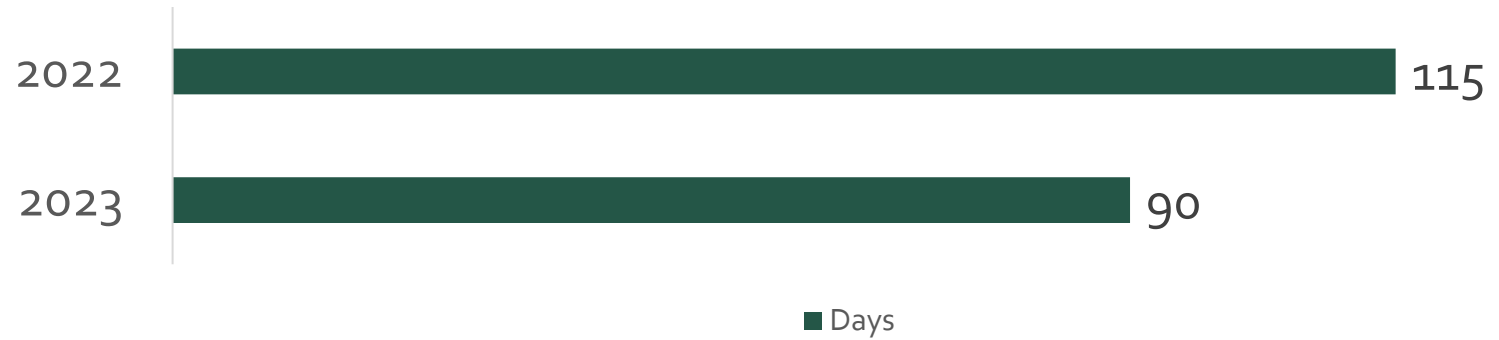


Infant Mortality Rate by Race/Ethnicity, 2019-2021

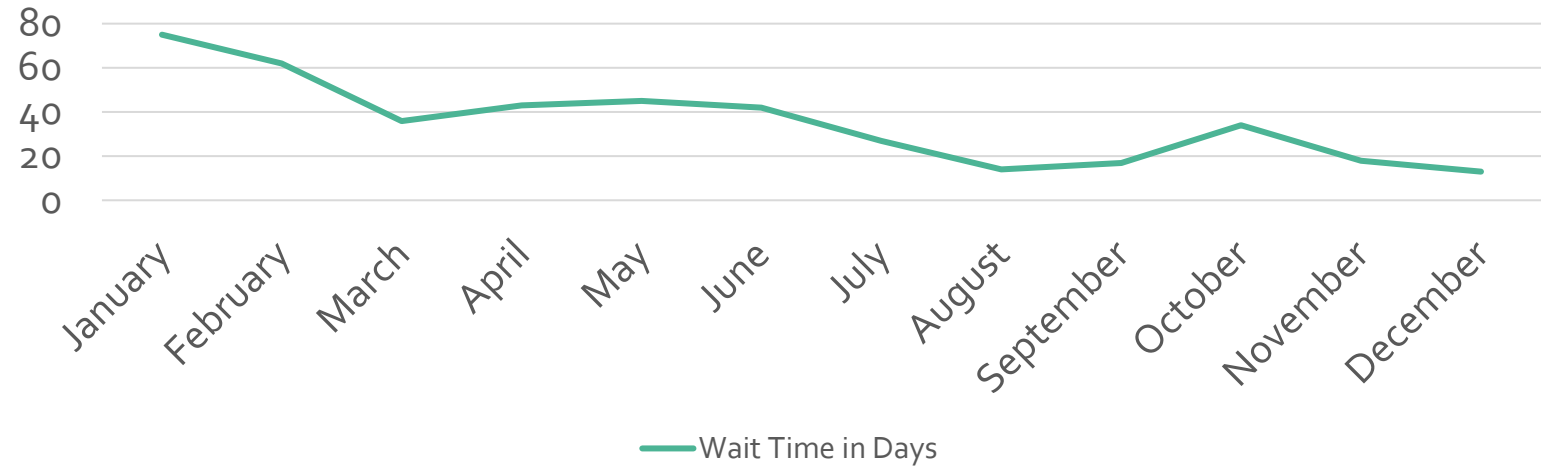

Wait Time in Days for New Clients Needing Services, 2023

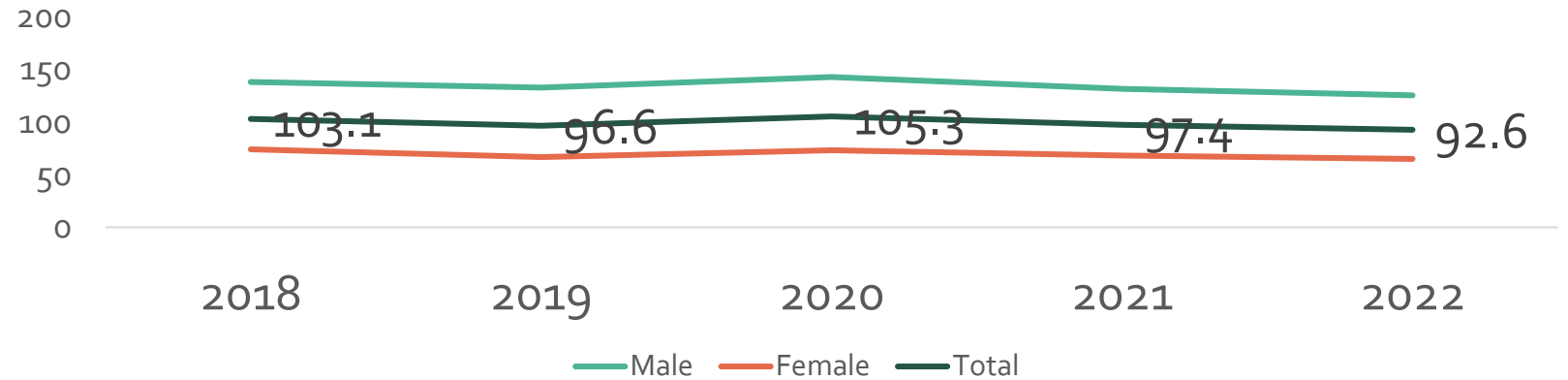

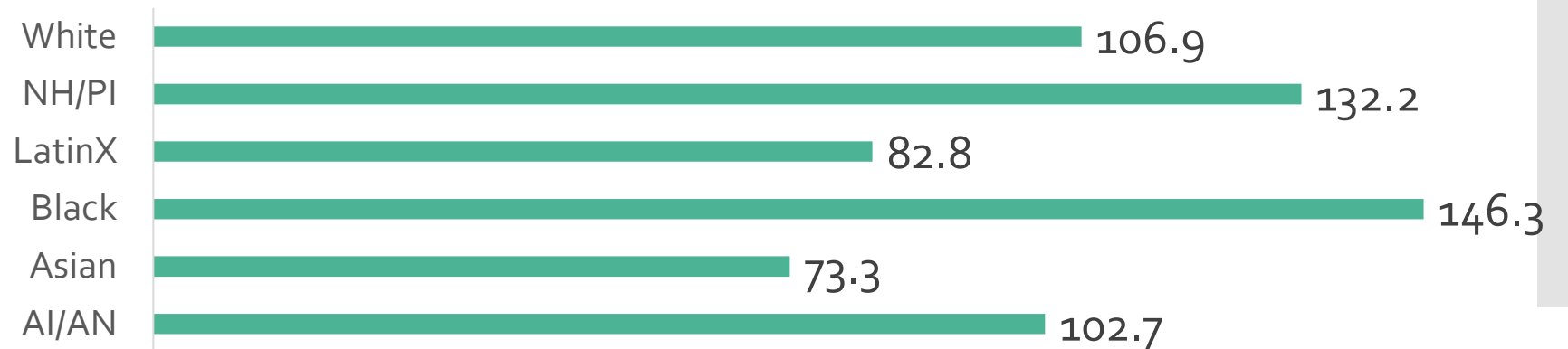

Age-Adjusted Death Rate, 2018-2022

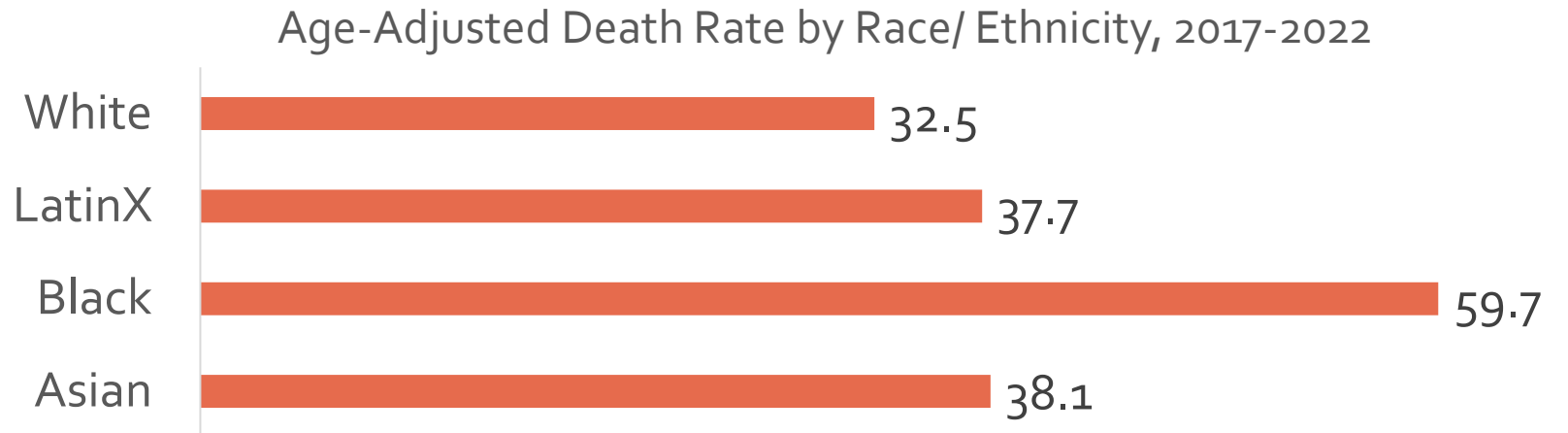
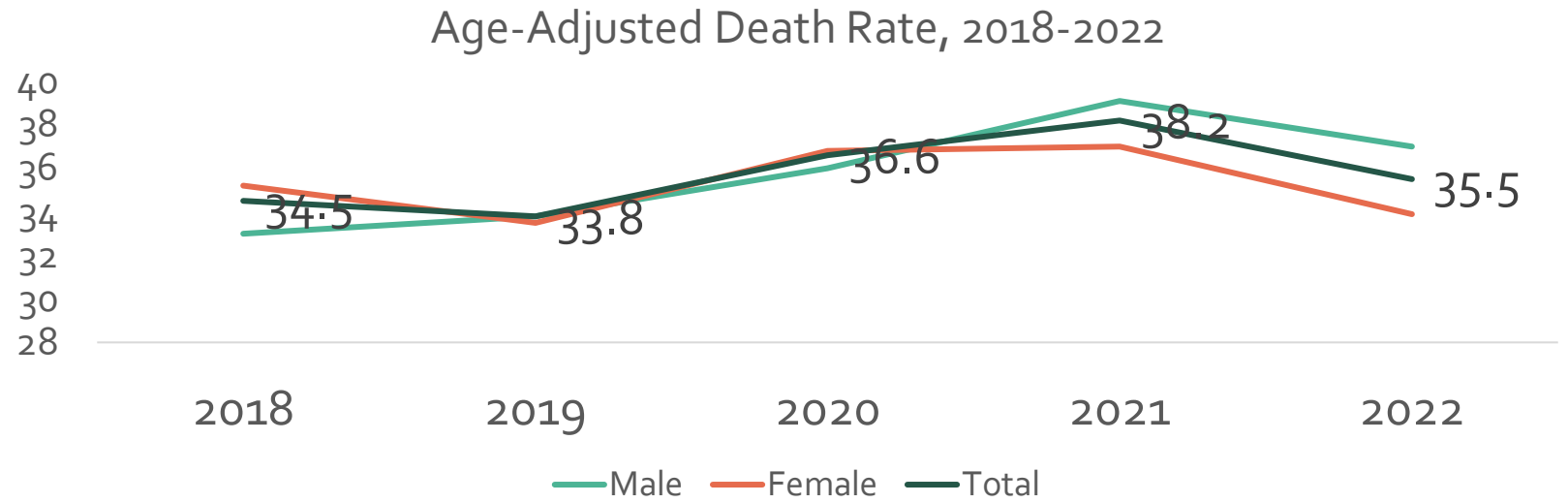


Age-Adjusted Death Rate by Race/Ethnicity, 2017-2022

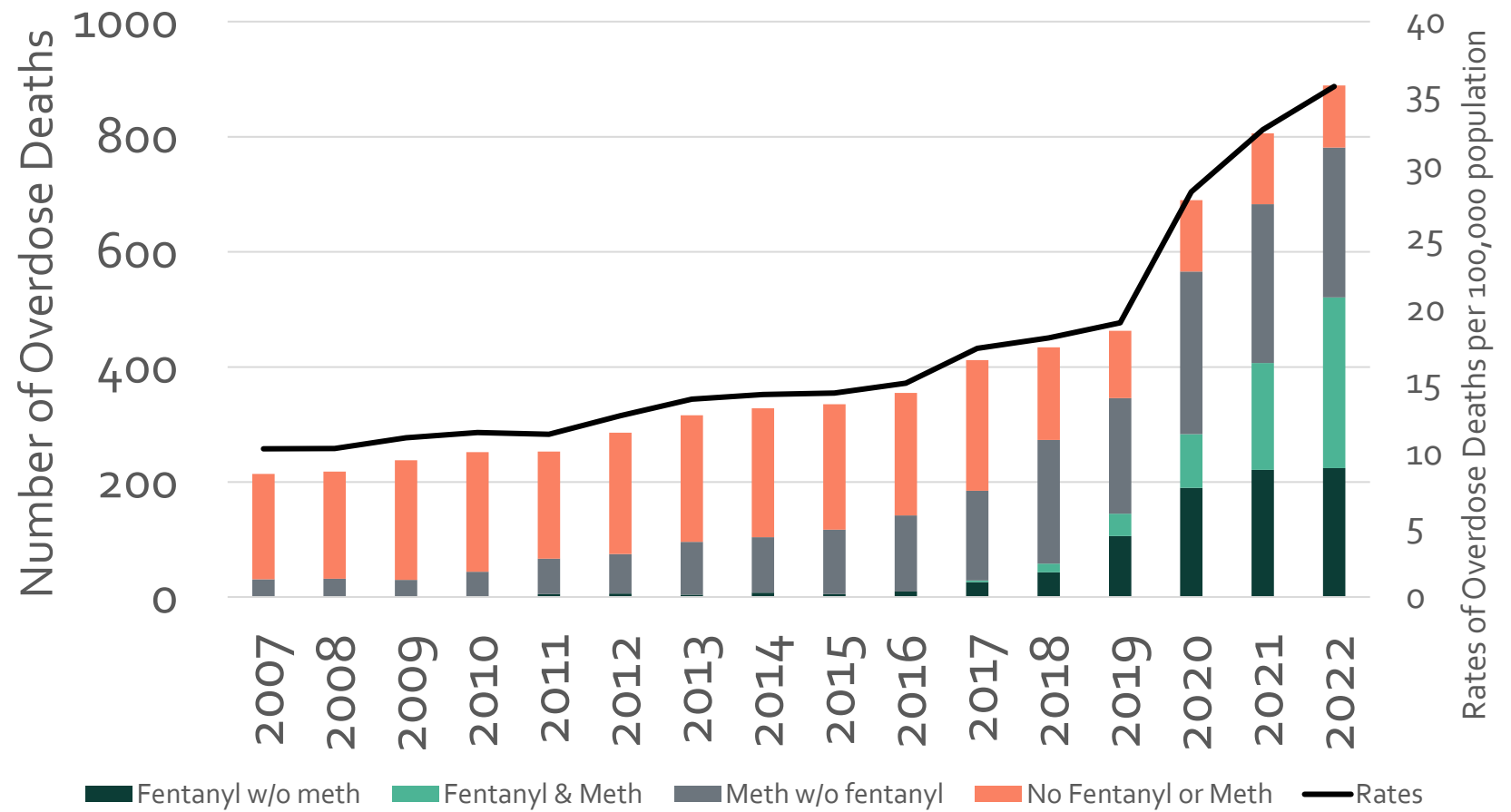

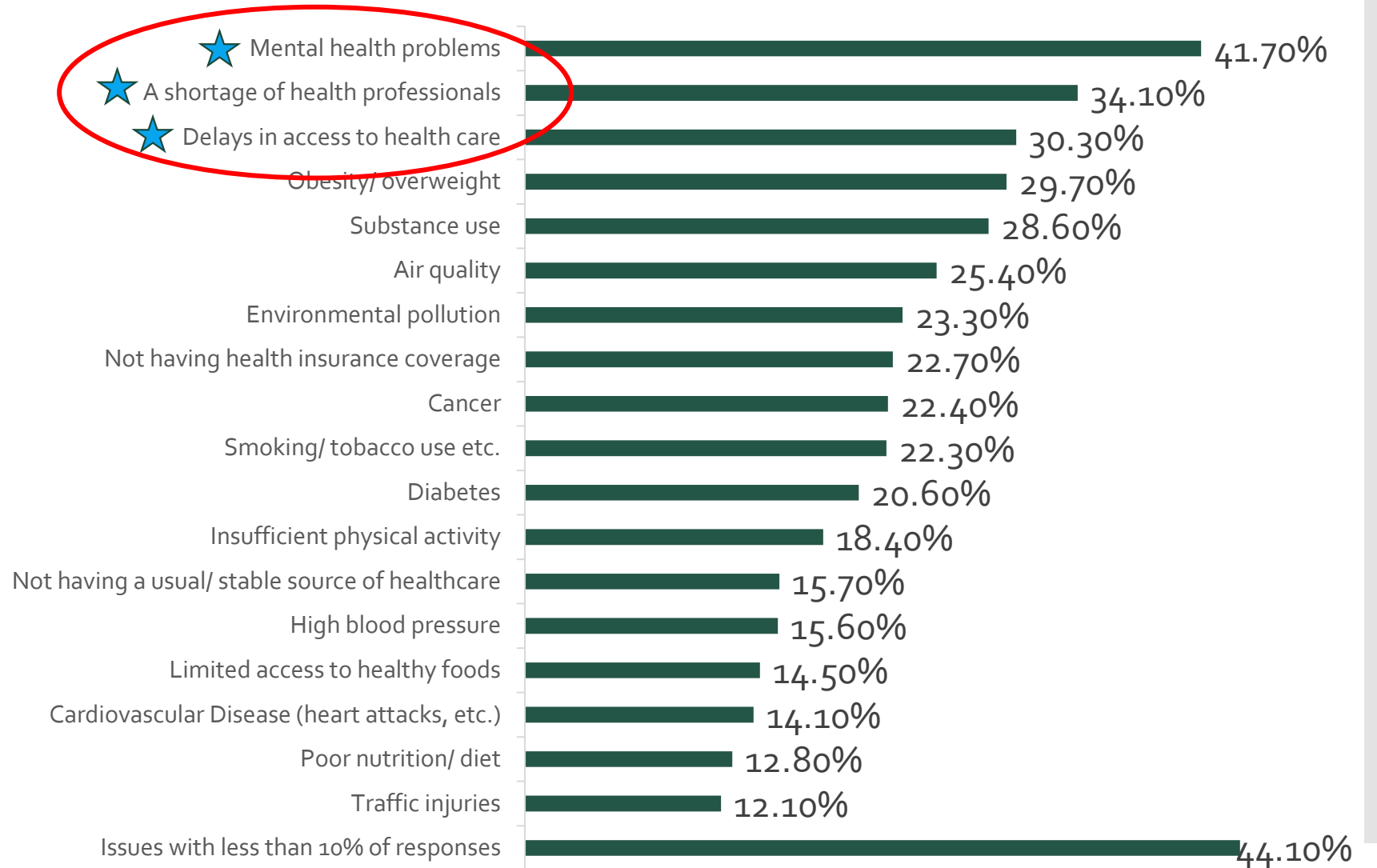

Importance/Climate Impacts in Our Region

Heat

- Daily maximum temperatures are projected to increase by 6-10°F by mid-century
- Region is already experiencing extreme heat events

Drought

- Studies show an increased likelihood of drought with an 80% chance of multi-decade drought by 2100

Wildfire

- Wildfires will increase in frequency, range, and severity, with a projected increase of 60-75% of land burned by the end of the century

Sustainable Growth

- Curbing greenhouse gas emissions from transportation and stopping the conversion of natural and working lands are key to meeting California's climate goals

Adaptation, Mitigation, Resilience

Adaptation

- *Adjusting* to the effects of change on our planet
- Taking action to protect buildings and infrastructure from slow and rapid onset weather events
- Diversifying crops in farming and food production to reflect the warmer, colder, or wetter conditions
- Behavior change to adjust to the effects of climate change, such as reducing food waste.

Mitigation

- *Reducing* the impact of climate change on our planet
- Transitioning to low-carbon energy sources and using emerging technologies to reduce or remove carbon dioxide from the atmosphere
- Protecting natural carbon sinks, such as forests and oceans
- Behavior change to reduce our collective carbon footprint

Resilience

- *Preparing* for the impacts of climate change and building capacity to recover quickly from those impacts
- Development of early warning systems to predict and monitor hazardous events, including extreme weather events;
- Increasing green spaces in urban areas to increase flood absorption capacity;
- and Planting trees to help manage extreme heat in urban areas.

Why Regional Collaboration?

- Working together helps agencies leverage and connect their own existing networks with others in the region
- To implement more effective solutions without being inhibited by administrative borders
- To provide a consistent strategy for protecting shared ecosystems like watersheds that jurisdictions both impact and rely on



Background and History

- Started in 2019 through CivicWell and awarded to Climate Resolve as a temporary coordinator (aka fiscal sponsor)
- From 2020-2022, staffed by a Climate Resolve director and a CivicSpark Fellow
- This time period consisted of recruitment efforts and building the collaborative
- Climate Resolve initiated the project knowing that the collaborative would eventually transfer over leadership to an in-region agency.
- In 2022, the ISC3 Steering Committee was formed and ISC3 became a member of the Alliance of Regional Collaboratives for Climate Adaptation (ARCCA)
- In Fall 2023, UCR School of Public Policy and Office of Sustainability became the new coordinators for ISC3
